the Housing Authority will be drawing less energy from the grid which helps all energy users," said Bushman.

Karen Hulette, who manages MOC's Heating System Repair and Replacement Program in partnership with Unitil was also at the Canton Valley complex on Wednesday during the formal announcement of the partnership.

"This is a significant project that will not only save money, but improve the comfort and reliability of the heating systems," said Hulette.

It's anticipated that new heating equipment will use about 20%

less natural gas annually or 6,233 therms. The electric upgrades electricity, enough energy to supply a home for an entire year.

In addition to replacing the old boilers, the complex's natural gas hot water heaters will also be replaced. Once removed, heated water from the new boilers will be stored in tanks for use by the complex's clients.
